Dental Sealant Project awarded \$1,000 Grant!

Eau Claire Area Foundation awards our program essential funds.

hanks to Linda Bohacek for submitting the proposal to the foundation. We met the goals of the grant, so JLEC was awarded \$1,000. These monies will be used to purchase a portable dental chair, a soft-sided carrying case for screening, and placing dental sealants on the children. We visited all 19 schools in Eau Claire County. We will continue to provide needed preventive services for children as long as grants continue to be awarded. JLEC volunteers are needed for future sealant days.

On Feb. 6, a day designated nationally as "Give Kids a Smile Day", three Midwest Dental Clinics opened their doors for a few hours and treated 68 children, many of them from the sealant program. These 68 children generated \$12,500 of dental treatment. There were about 100 children on the waiting list that were not seen. A big thank you to the Midwest Dental groups! This was a great partnership that we hope to continue through the coming years.



Recipes

Raspberry Champagne Cocktail

½ (6 oz) can frozen lemonade concentrate, thawed

- 2 T. Grand Marnier
- 2 T. honey, warmed

1/2 (750 ml) bottle chilled champagne

Fresh raspberries

Combine the lemonade and Grand Marnier in a pitcher. Add the honey, stirring until dissolved. Stir in the champagne. Pour into glasses; garnish with raspberries.

Chocolate Cake dressed in Berries

½ c. toasted almonds, finely chopped

3 T. unsweetened cocoa powder

1/3 c. butter

½ c. sugar

2 T. brown sugar

2 eggs

½ t. vanilla

1/4 c. chopped fresh strawberries

1/4 c. strawberry preserves

2 T. heavy cream

3 oz semi-sweet chocolate chips

strawberries for garnish

Combine the almonds and cocoa powder in a small bowl. Cream the butter and sugars in a bowl until fluffy. Beat in the eggs and the vanilla. Fold in the almond mixture, then the fresh strawberries. Spoon mixture into a greased 8-inch spring form pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 35-45 minutes or until cake tests done. Cool completely. Remove from the pan. Spread with the strawberry preserves. Bring cream to a boil in a small saucepan. Remove from heat and add chocolate chips. Stir until smooth; cool for 5 minutes. Pour over top of cake (let drizzle down the sides). Garnish with fresh strawberries.

Chocolate Toffee Bars

Makes 32

2 c. light brown sugar

2 c. butter at room temp

2 egg yolks

1 ½ t. vanilla extract

4 c. all-purpose flour

½ t. salt

6 oz. unsweetened chocolate, broken into squares

1 c. walnuts or pecans, chopped

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Beat the sugar and butter until light and fluffy. Beat in the egg yolks and vanilla, then stir in the flour and salt to make a soft dough.

Spread the dough in a greased 13x9x2 inch baking pan. Level the surface and bake for 25-30 minutes, until lightly browned.

Remove from the oven and immediately place the chocolate squares on the hot base. Set aside until the chocolate softens, then spread evenly with a spatula. Sprinkle with the chopped nuts. While still warm, cut into 2x1 ½ inch bars, remove from pan and cool on a wire rack.

HEALTH TIP... Chocolate Lover?

Chocolate can be a healthy addition to your diet. Why? The cocoa bean contains several kinds of antioxidant flavonoids, which are good for you. Dark chocolate contains the most cocoa of any type of chocolate (along with the least sugar and the healthiest kind of fat). One brand, Dove Dark, is said to contain far higher antioxidant levels than most other dark chocolates because of the special way it is processed. So go ahead, enjoy some chocolate.
