Their large warehouse, complete with freezer and cooler space, allows for storage of vast quantities of food which is then distributed to more than 60 hunger relief agencies. Since the early 1970s the number of overweight children in our countries has increased dramatically, substantially increasing children's risks for health problems such as type 2 diabetes, high blood pressure and high cholesterol. Kids in the Kitchen is held in March, during National Nutrition Month in the U.S. and Canada. JLEC has partnered with the Boys and Girls Club for our KIK program, which allows us to take advantage of their newly renovated kitchen and to make connections with other community programs with similar goals. For the past two years, JLEC has hosted a KIK event each Friday in the month of March, from cooking demonstrations to learning about honey bees to yoga instruction! Literacy Volunteers' Scrabble Bee

This is Literacy Volunteers' signature fundraiser; all Scrabble Bee proceeds directly support their programs and services. More than 1 in 10 adults in the Chippewa Valley are unable to read. Many of them have children and want to break the intergenerational cycle of low literacy. Literacy Volunteers provides training and guidance to volunteer tutors who work with adult students to develop reading, writing and speaking skills. Goals often include: passing a driver's test, obtaining a GED, enhancing job qualifications, learning computer skills, reading to one's child, managing a checkbook, or understanding healthcare maintenance for a family member.

Sealants Today for Smiles Tomorrow

Eau Claire County statistics indicate that 10% of children are living in poverty. These children have very limited access to dental care, which is why Junior League of Eau Claire has for many years been a partner in the Sealants Today for Smiles Tomorrow program. We help provide dental screening for underprivileged children, place dental sealants and educate parents and children about dental health to help prevent future disease. During the 2008-2009 school year, 923 children from 15 schools in Eau Claire County participated, which was an 8% increase over the previous year. More are anticipated this year due to economic downturn. Volunteers are needed to guide children from their classrooms to the sealant site and back. Most importantly, we interact with the students and help them feel comfortable as they wait their turn. Sealant days are:
